Lung cancer screening can save your life





Lung cancer screening is covered by insurance

Private health plans and Washington State Medicaid (Washington Apple Health) cover screening for eligible individuals ages 55–80 with no patient out-of-pocket expense. Medicare covers screening for eligible individuals ages 55–77.

What does screening involve?

The scan is fast, simple and painless, and you stay fully clothed. This special kind of X-ray, called a low-dose CT scan, takes multiple pictures of you as you lie on a table that slides in and out of a machine.

Am I eligible for lung cancer screening?

You may benefit from an annual screening if all of the following statements are true:

- ✓ You are **between 55 and 80** years old.
- ✓ You **currently smoke** or **quit in the last 15 years**.
- ✓ You smoked an average of at least **one pack a day for 30 years** or **two packs a day for 15 years**.
